TOPIC: Vikings/Anglo-Saxons

PREVIOUS KNOWLEDGE: The Stone Age was when humans made tools from stone, this lasted until the Bronze Age. The Bronze Age began when settlers arrived from Europe to Britain. These settlers brought with them metal (bronze) to make tools. The Iron Age lasted from 800BC until the Roman Invasion AD43 - this was when people used tools from iron. In AD43, the Romans under the order of Emperor Claudius first invaded Britain and Roman rule lasted until AD410. The Anglo-Saxons settled in Britain when the Romans left in AD410.
